Thoughts on the Gospel for this week:

This week we begin a new church year with Advent Sunday. I often say that Advent is my favourite time in the church year. Ordinarily we come into church on Advent Sunday and see the purple on the altar, and there is that immediate sense of hopefulness and looking forward.

The other time in the church year when we use purple is of course Lent. However the two seasons couldn't be more different. Lent is a rather sombre time of year, and leads us to the time of Our Lord's suffering before we celebrate Easter. Advent is very different; there is no great period of suffering, simply a time of looking forward with joy to a season of greater joy: Christmass.

Everything about Advent is positive, happy, optimistic. The hymns at Advent (which sadly the congregation will not be able to sing this year) are the loveliest in the hymnal, and throughout the season we concentrate our minds on hope. Hope is something we need more now than ever. At the present time, a lot of people will be struggling to see it, as day by day we hear on our radios of job losses and so forth; growing up in the 1980s, the effects of mass unemployment are etched on my memory, and they are uncomfortable. Seeing this coming again is deeply worrying, and as a Church we will find ourselves needing to respond in practical ways which we haven't needed to possibly for decades. It will be a challenge for all Churches and all churches.

Yet advent gives us hope...in church we are preparing for Our Lord's birth, and this season has that optimism of a family which is about to welcome a new member; a new baby. I happily remember as a child the occasions on which I heard those immortal words, "your mother's gone into hospital to have the baby – you're going round your nans!" I heard those words more than once, and every time there was excitement.

Christmass gives us that joy, but what of Advent? Advent is the time of preparation, the time of looking forward, the time of hopeful anticipation. Part of anticipation is looking forward with hope but perhaps with an amount of trepidation; and for many this year Advent will not only bring great anticipated joy, but also tremendous pressure: we know all too well the financial stresses of Christmass.

The gospel this week reminds us to stand ready – to be alert, to be diligent – because those in the house don't know when the master will return from his travels. We are told that he could come at any time, and they must be ready; 'stay awake' we are told.

Of course, we know when Christmass will come, just as we know when Advent begins. The two are in fact separate – it is too early to decorate our living rooms, let alone our streets! Advent speaks for itself; it has its own joy. It is a time of anticipation, but not a time of actual arrival. We are told to stay awake, because the time has not yet come. We are told to stand ready, so that when He comes we shall be ready. Not just to eat the lovely food, not just to open the lovely presents, but to celebrate the birth of Him who gave himself up for us.
