This time of year we see the Church at its liturgically most powerful. We enter Holy Week on Palm Sunday, and we live with Our Lord through the whole of that week, until we come to Good Friday – the darkest day in the church calendar. Three days later, on Easter Sunday, we go from the darkness of Good Friday to the great joy and celebration of Easter. It is, in effect, a liturgical whirlwind!

Easter is a time of hope. It is the time when we think about the Resurrection – but it also reminds us that the Resurrection is celebrated at every Mass, both on Sundays and in the week. I remember our vicar when I was approaching my teen years saying that 'every Sunday is a little Easter'.

This year we have the 2nd Easter we will have had in lockdown. In a sense it is more of a challenge because we have had this now on and off for a year, and we are all of us sick and tired of it – yet we stick with it because we know it is for a reason, and that we need to continue to protect one another until at least the vaccine has been further rolled out.

There is, however, a very great difference in church terms with last year. Last year, despite the Government permitting us to live stream from our churches, the archbishop banned us from doing so. This year we are – quite rightly – able to live stream from our churches; and this makes a tremendous difference. Indeed, church is the place for divine worship to take place, our dining rooms are for lunch, dinner and entertaining, but not for the administration of the Church's Sacraments.

It was at this time last year, that Her Majesty the Queen spoke to the nation, and particularly about the message of Easter, to build our spirits, and boost our morale. I know clergy up and down the country will always be appreciative to her for those inspiring and wise words. This year, not only can we live-stream from our churches, and tune in on the facebook page – but we can, actually attend church in person; unless we are required to remain shielded.

We also have a sense of hope in the vaccine this year – that as more and more of us get our vaccination, the nearer we get to a return to a new normal. It is our anticipation of seeing our close relatives, our friends, our work colleagues; having holidays when we can relax in places we enjoy, and recharge our batteries.

This Easter we have perhaps the most challenging time we have ever known. Yet we also have hope. When Our Lord suffered on the Cross of Good Friday, it wasn't in vain; on Easter Sunday we have the Resurrection, where Our Lord rose from the dead, and misery turns to joy. Our lockdown will not be in vain either, it is tiresome, and I for one do not enjoy not seeing people — I love chatting with people, having cups of coffee, having a slice of cake, a laugh and a joke, or a serious conversation. This I have missed during this year as we all will have.

Yet just as Our Lord was victorious over the grave of Good Friday with the triumph of Easter, so we too will reach our new normal, and all our sacrifices will be fully worthwhile.

I wish you a very Happy and Holy Easter, and every happiness in the continuation of this year.
