This week at S Mary's and S Saviour's

Welcome to S Mary's and S Saviour's - Lockdown eases - to a point: this week we see an ease in restrictions, but I hope people will continue to take practices make them feel safe and at ease. If you wish to wear your mask that is still encouraged where practical. The ease in restrictions doesn't invite us to go too mad: most of us are now fully vaccinated which is superb, but it's still best to be as safe as possible.

Congregational singing returns!! (at least as I write!): Today we are able to sing for the first time in a year and a half. Please follow the mass setting sheet, and hymns are as usual on the board. I hope we will enjoy the return to singing. Most of us are up to date with our vaccines, but those who are happier wearing masks are still encouraged to do so: although it might be best to remove them for singing!

Holy Communion: We are at the moment recommended to receive Holy Communion into the hands. That means that you must prepare to do so by moving the mask (if you are wearing one) before you take the Host, so that you can receive it straight away. It should also be into your hands, and not be placed onto gloves of any sort. Neither the Priest nor the Communicant say anything. I hope that we shall soon reach the stage when these rules can be relaxed and we can return to a more reverent custom.

On line Masses: Mass will be live streamed daily this week from S Mary's and I also hope people will come in person. When restrictions eventually come to an end, the Sunday Mass will need to be in person, but weekdays will still be live-streamed for the time being; Please come to Mass on Sundays at least in person if you possibly can!

Additional Masses Ist Sunday of each month: As from August Ist there will be an additional Mass on the first Sunday of each month. I am aware that there are a number of people who do now struggle with the 9:15 morning slot at S Mary's. Therefore there will be an additional Mass at 4pm on the Ist Sunday of each month, which when possible will be a High Mass in the Extraordinary Form.

<u>The assumption – S Mary's Patronal:</u> The Assumption will be celebrated on <u>SATURDAY</u> <u>AUGUST 14TH AT 12 NOON.</u> There will be a small choir to sing a choral mass setting which will be advertised soon; I don't yet know what we can do about refreshments but I hope we can offer some light refreshment this year.

<u>In your prayers please remember</u>: those affected by the floods recently – especially those in London, and parts of The Netherlands, Germany and Belgium. Also please remember all children on school holidays as well as school Teachers and Ancilliary Staff who are having a very well deserved break after an especially difficult school year.

GOSPEL John 6:1-15

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, "Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?" He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, "Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, "There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?" Jesus said to them, "Make the people sit down." There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, "Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted." So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, "This really is the prophet who is to come into the world." Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.
